

LAST WEEK - SHELTERBOX AUSTRALIA

ShelterBox is an international disaster relief charity that provides temporary shelter and lifesaving supplies to displaced families. We were given a presentation by Anthony Keating from ShelterBox Australia.





Each ShelterBox typically contains a tent designed to withstand extreme weather conditions, water purification kit, blankets, tools, and other necessities to help a family survive after a disaster. The contents of a ShelterBox are tailored to the nature and location of the disaster.

ShelterBox Response Teams distribute Boxes on the ground, working closely with local organisations, international aid agencies and Rotary clubs worldwide.

The first consignment of 143 Boxes was sent to victims of the 2001 Gujarat earthquake. Over the next three years the project matured and by the end of 2004 nearly 2,600 Boxes had been dispatched, following 16 major disasters.



The company significantly expanded its work in response to the 2004 Indian Ocean earthquake and tsunami. Denys was the Commonwealth of Australia Medical Co-ordinator for this incident and asked the Indonesian Government at Banda Aceh what they needed. The reply was "Water, shelter and food in that order." Denys contacted the Australian Army Engineers and arranged for their portable water purification plant to be despatched. Then Denys, as

a Rotarian knew about ShelterBoxes and contacted the organisation and arranged for 500 Boxes to be sent. Australia did not have anything like that number of Boxes but arranged for England to provide them. For the food, Denys contacted the Salvation Army and they immediately responded.

The Banda Aceh organisers also told Denys that he was the only one to ask what was needed. The airstrip used to get two flights a day but was then receiving five flights an hour. The aircraft had provided ten containers of toys! Other material, filling just about all the space at the airfield, was also of no use following the disaster. Denys suggested that they empty the containers and use them as shelters. He was later congratulated and thanked for his work.

One of ShelterBox's largest responses was the 7.0 magnitude earthquake in Haiti in 2010. ShelterBox provided shelter for 28,000 families or approximately 25% of all tents delivered in areas surrounding Port-au-Prince.



In 2010, the Australian and Canadian branches of ShelterBox split from the main organization and formed new organizations called Disaster Aid Australia and Disaster Aid.

After the 2011 Tōhoku earthquake and tsunami in Japan, ShelterBox provided assistance to about 1,600 families in the disaster region.

Each ShelterBox typically contains a tent designed to withstand extreme weather conditions, water purification kit, blankets, tools, and other necessities to help a family survive after a disaster. The contents of a ShelterBox are tailored to the nature and location of the disaster. Each Box is designed to provide support for ten people with not only shelter but also to support the needs for living.



Each Box is 57cm wide, 84cm long and 60 cm deep. The weight is between 50 and 60 kg, which if you have to carry it, is quite heavy. The Box also can be used to store water and will hold 185 litres.

Each Box is designed to cost \$1 000 Australian Dollars. That is just \$100 per person and this is often what saves their life.

We learned a lot from Anthony and, in recognition for the support provided by ShelterBox Australia, we, as the Rotary Club of Macarthur Sunrise, donated two boxes.

We don't know when our boxes will be used but we will be provided with the Box serial numbers and will be able to see where and for what incident they were used.

Anthony expressed his thanks for our interest and, most importantly, for our support.
